Dr. Amarnath Amarasingam *Queen's University*

Amarnath Amarasingam is an Assistant Professor in the School of Religion, and is cross-appointed to the Department of Political Studies, at Queen's University in Ontario, Canada. He is also a Senior Research Fellow at the Institute for Strategic Dialogue and an Associate Fellow at the International Centre for the Study of Radicalisation. His research interests are in terrorism, radicalization and extremism, online communities, diaspora politics, post-war reconstruction, and the sociology of religion.

He is the author of Pain, Pride, and Politics: Sri Lankan Tamil Activism in Canada (2015), and the co-editor of Sri Lanka: The Struggle for Peace in the Aftermath of War (2016). He has also written several peer-reviewed articles and book chapters, has presented papers at over 100 national and international conferences, and has written for The New York Times, The Monkey Case, The Washington Post, CNN, Politico, The Atlantic, and Foreign Affairs. Dr. Jean-Christophe Boucher

Assistant Professor, School of Public Policy and Department of Political Science, University of Calgary

Jean-Christophe Boucher is an Assistant Professor at the School of Public Policy and Department of Political Science at the University of Calgary. Dr. Boucher is a co-lead of the Canadian Network on Information and Security, funded by the Department of National Defence. He is also a director of research in civil-military relations at the Canadian Defence and Security Network funded by the Social Science and Humanities Research Council.

His COVID research is funded by Alberta Innovates. Dr. Boucher is a fellow at the Canadian Global Affairs Institute; a research Fellow at the Centre for the Study of Security and Development at Dalhousie University; Senior Fellow at the Centre interuniversitaire de recherche sur les relations internationales du Canada et du Québec. He holds a BA in History from the University of Ottawa, a MA in Philosophy from the Université de Montréal and a PhD in Political Science from Université Laval.

He specializes in international relations, with an emphasis on Canadian foreign and defence policies, international security, and methodology. He is the author, with Kim Richard Nossal, of The Politics of War. Canada's Mission in Afghanistan, 2001-14 (UBC Press, 2017) and of many peer reviewed chapters. He has published in academic journals Journal of Politics, International Journal, Études Internationales, American Review of Canadian Studies.



Prof. William Braun III

Professor of Practice Strategic Studies Institute [SSI], US Army War College

Professor "Trey" Braun is a Professor of Practice with the Strategic Studies Institute (SSI), U.S. Army War College (USAWC), a position he has held for 8-years. Professor Braun's research agenda includes national strategy and policy analysis, land forces employment, senior military leadership, and military-society relations. He last deployed as the Director, CJ-7 (Force Integration, Training, and Education Directorate), Combined Security Transition Command-Afghanistan (CSTC-A).

His 30-year Army career included multiple tactical aviation and planner assignments at Division and Corps, and multiple force management assignments on the Army staff, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC), and the U.S. Army Recruiting Command.

Professor Braun holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Alfred University and master's degrees from the USAWC (Strategic Studies), School of Advanced Military Science (Military Art & Science), and Webster University (Business).



Ms. Elisabeth Braw

Senior Fellow, American Enterprise Institute (AEI)

Elisabeth Braw is a senior fellow at the American Enterprise Institute (AEI), where she focuses on defence against greyzone threats. She is also a columnist with Foreign Policy, where she writes on national security and the globalised economy.

Before joining AEI, Elisabeth was a senior research fellow at RUSI, whose Modern Deterrence project she led. Prior to that, she worked at Control Risks, a global risk consultancy. Elisabeth is also a member of the steering committee of the Aurora Forum (the UK-Nordic-Baltic leader conference), a member of the UK National Preparedness Commission and an associate fellow at the European Leadership Network.

Elisabeth started her career as a journalist, reporting for Newsweek, the Christian Science Monitor and the international Metro group of newspapers, among others. She regularly writes op-eds, including for the Financial Times, Politico, the Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung (writing in German) and the Wall Street Journal. She is also the author of God's Spies, about the Stasi (Eerdmans, 2019) and The Defender's Dilemma (September 2021).

Elisabeth attended university in Germany, graduating with a Magister Artium in political science and German literature.



B-Gen Krista Brodie

Vice President of Logistics and Operations for Public Health Agency of Canada / Commander of Military Personnel Generation Group (MPGG), Canadian Armed Forces

In the humble tradition of military families, I spent the summers of my youth traversing Canada in the backseat of a station-wagon, reading comic books, and instigating countless refrains of "Are we there yet? Are we having fun yet?"

Brigadier-General Mark E.K. Campbell, CD Canadian Armed Forces

Brigadier-General Mark Campbell joined 4th Battalion, The Royal Canadian Regiment, as a Private in Stratford, Ontario in 1981. He commissioned in 1987, ultimately commanding the Battalion from December 2002 to June 2005. While with 4 RCR he deployed on OP RECUPERATION (1998 Ice Storm) as a Company Commander and commanded 31 Light Infantry Battalion, a composite battalion that participated in brigade and area-level collective training.

In June 2005, BGen Campbell was posted to the Canadian Land Forces Command and Staff College. He spent two years as Directing Staff on the Primary Reserve Army Operations Course, and then completed a two year exchange with the United States Army Reserve, teaching on the Command and General Staff Course. Upon return to Canada, he assumed the position of Deputy Commander, 31 Canadian Brigade Group.

He was promoted Colonel in September 2010, commanding 31 Canadian Brigade Group until August 2012. BGen Campbell was then posted to Land Force Central Area Headquarters in Toronto as Assistant Chief of Staff (Support). In August 2014, BGen Campbell was posted to Army Headquarters and was appointed the Associate Director of the Canadian Army Land Warfare Centre. In August 2016 BGen Campbell was promoted to his current rank and was appointed Deputy Commander of 4th Canadian Division and in July 2019 he assumed his current position as Deputy Commander Reserve, Canadian Army Doctrine and Training Centre in Kingston, Ontario.

BGen Campbell resides in London, Ontario and is married with two adult daughters. He has worked at General Dynamics Land Systems Canada since 1992, currently working as a Program Manager. In his spare time, BGen Campbell is an avid and very amateur photographer.



Dr. Howard Coombs *CIDP Deputy Director. Associate Professor, RMC*

DR. HOWARD G. COOMBS retired from full-time duty with the Canadian Armed Forces in 2003 and transferred to the Canadian Army Reserve, where he continues to serve on a part-time basis. He is currently assigned to the staff of the Chief of Reserves, in Ottawa, as a Strategic Advisor, in the rank of Colonel. From 1976-1979 Coombs was member of 2415 Gonzaga Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps in St. John's, Newfoundland. Since enrolling in the CAF in 1979, Coombs has had the privilege of command from platoon to brigade, as well as held a variety of staff and training positions. His command experience includes service with the 1st and 2nd Battalions, The Royal Canadian Regiment, 3 Commando, Canadian Airborne Regiment, Princess of Wales' Own Regiment, and 33 Canadian Brigade Group. His current regimental affiliation is the PWOR. He is a graduate of the Canadian Forces Staff School, Canadian Land Force Command and Staff College, United States Army Command and General Staff College, and the US Army School of Advanced Military Studies, which awarded his Master's degree. Coombs received his PhD in military history from Queen's University in Kingston, Ontario and is currently an Associate Professor of History at the Royal Military College of Canada.

Coombs has operational deployments to the former Yugoslavia (Croatia 1994-1995, and Bosnia-Herzegovina 1998) and Afghanistan (2004) as a military officer. In addition, he deployed with Joint Task Force Afghanistan from September 2010 to July 2011 as a civilian advisor to the Task Force Commander. He has received both the Canadian Forces Medallion for Distinguished Service and the Order of Military Merit. Moreover, he has been awarded the US Army Basic Parachutist qualification, US National Infantry Association Order of St. Maurice, and is a US Army Master Strategist (6Z). His research interests are Canadian professional military education, in addition to Canadian military operations and training since the Cold War.

From February to July 2020 Coombs was at the Research Division of the NATO Defense College in Rome as the first Canadian Mobilising Insights in Defense and Security Program (MINDS) Fellow.



Dr. Carol Evans

Director, SSI, US Army War College (USAWC)

Dr. Carol V. Evans is Director of the Strategic Studies Institute and the USAWC Press at the US Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. Her areas of specialization are geoeconomics, intelligence, and international security. She has served as Advisor to the Director of Central Intelligence, Technical Advisor to the National Ground Intelligence Center, Department of the Army, and as Advisor to the Defense Science Board, OSD. Prior to joining the USAWC, Dr. Evans was Senior Program Manager, National Security Global Business Division, with Battelle Memorial Institute. Dr. Evans' operational experience includes deployments with the US Navy Third Fleet, US Pacific Fleet. Dr. Evans has held a variety of faculty and research positions: Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service, the University of California, Berkeley, Harvard University, Washington University, St. Louis, and at the Brookings Institution. She holds an MSc and a Ph.D. degree from the London School of Economics. She is a life member on the Council on Foreign Relations.



General Wayne Eyre, CMM, MSC, CD *A-CDS, Canadian Armed Forces*

Gen Eyre grew up on a farm near Wadena, Saskatchewan, and spent his high school years in Medicine Hat, Alberta. He joined Army Cadets at age 12 and has been in uniform ever since. Gen Eyre attended Royal Roads Military College (RRMC) Victoria and Royal Military College of Canada (RMC) Kingston. Upon commissioning in 1988 he joined Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, and has had the great privilege of spending the majority of his career in command or deputy command positions, including commanding 3rd Battalion PPCLI, 2 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group, 3rd Canadian Division and Joint Task Force West, Deputy Commanding General –Operations for XVIII (US) Airborne Corps, Deputy Commander Military Personnel Command, Deputy Commander United Nations Command in Korea, and for a short time Commander of Military Personnel Command. He became Commander Canadian Army on 20 August 2019 and was appointed as Acting Chief of the Defence Staff on 24 February 2021.

Operationally, Gen Eyre has commanded a rifle platoon with the United Nations Force in Cyprus; 2PPCLI's Reconnaissance Platoon with the UN Protection Force in Croatia (including the MedakPocket); a rifle company in Bosnia with NATO's Stabilization Force; the Canadian Operational Mentor and Liaison Team in Kandahar, Afghanistan advising 1-205 Afghan National Army Brigade in combat; as the Commanding General of NATO Training Mission –Afghanistan, where he oversaw the force generation, institutional training, and professional development of the Afghan National Security Forces; and as the first non-U.S. Deputy Commander of United Nations Command Korea in its 69 year history, and as such is the most senior Canadian officer ever permanently stationed in the Asia Pacific region. Among various domestic operations, he was the military liaison to the Government of Manitoba for the 1997 floods, commanded a company fighting the 1998 BC forest fires, commanded the Task Force that secured the 2010 G8 Summit, and commanded the military response to both the 2015 Saskatchewan wildfires and the 2016 Fort McMurray evacuation. As a staff officer, Gen Eyre has served with the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, Land Force Western Area Headquarters, in the Directorate of Defence Analysis at NDHQ, and as the J3 of Canadian Expeditionary Force Command. He is a graduate of the U.S. Army

Special Forces Qualification Course, the U.S. Marine Corps Command and Staff College, the U.S. Marine Corps School of Advanced Warfighting, and the U.S. Army War College. He holds a Bachelor of Science and three Masters Degrees (Military Studies, Operational Studies and Strategic Studies). His decorations include the Order of Military Merit in therank of Commander, the Meritorious Service Cross, the Commander-in-Chief Unit Commendation, the Chief of Defence Staff Commendation, the Order of National Security Merit from South Korea and was three times awarded the U.S. Legion of Merit, including at the rank of Commander.



Prof. Nate Freier

Associate Professor of National Security Studies, Strategic Studies Institute (SSI)

Nathan Freier is strategy and risk professional as an Associate Professor of National Security Studies with the United States Army War College's (USAWC) Strategic Studies Institute (SSI). His areas of expertise are defense and military strategy and policy development, strategic planning, net and risk assessment, strategic forecasting, and international security futures. Among other issues, he recently completed work on "pacing threats" to the US homeland, He also persistently co-leads study efforts on INDOPACOM-related threats, strategy, concepts, plans, and risk most recently resulting in publication of the 2020 report "An Army Transformed: INDOPACOM Hypercompetition and U.S. Army Theater Design." In addition, to an "Army Transformed", Mr. Freier's Indo-Pacific work has yielded multiple working papers and analysis pieces through 2020-2021. This includes two major unpublished DoD-sponsored works on China-Taiwan and the US-Japan alliance and US Indian Ocean Strategy. Previously, Mr. Freier was the project director and principal author two high-impact DoD-sponsored USAWC research efforts. The first was 2016's "Outplayed: Regaining Strategic Initiative in the Gray Zone." The second was 2017's "At Our Own Peril: DoD Risk Assessment in a Post-Primacy World." Mr. Freier is a former career military officer, Army strategist, and Washington DC think tank analyst. Mr. Freier is a veteran of numerous strategy development and strategic planning efforts at Headquarters, Department of the Army; the Office of the Secretary of Defense; and two senior-level military staffs in Iraq. He is widely published on defense and national security issues and has consistently been a source of expert advice for the national security, defense, and military communities of interest and practice.

He holds a Bachelor of Science and three Masters Degrees (Military Studies, Operational Studies and Strategic Studies). His decorations include the Order of Military Merit in the rank of Commander, the Meritorious Service Cross, the Commander-in-Chief Unit Commendation, the Chief of Defence Staff Commendation, the Order of National Security Merit from South Korea and was three times awarded the U.S. Legion of Merit, including at the rank of Commander.

AP Greener is currently New Zealand's ASEAN Regional Forum's Eminent Expert Representative, has been a member of the UN Police Division's International Policing Advisory Council, is a guest lecturer at the NZDF Command and Staff College, and regularly engages in a range of Track II and Track 1.5 diplomatic events across the Asia Pacific Region. She is the Massey University lead for the three-year 'Rebalancing Army' project that is currently underway in partnership with the New Zealand Army.

Stéfanie von Hlatky is Director of the Centre for International and Defence Policy (2020; 2013-2017) at Queen's University and an associate professor in the Dept of Political Studies. Her research focuses on NATO, armed forces, military interventions, and defence policy.

She received her Ph.D. in Political Science from Université de Montréal in 2010, where she was also Executive Director for the Centre for International Peace and Security Studies. She's held positions at Georgetown University, the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars, Dartmouth College, ETH Zurich and was a Fulbright Visiting Research Chair at the University of Southern California's Centre for Public Diplomacy in 2016.

She has published in the Canadian Journal of Political Science, the Canadian Foreign Policy Journal, Contemporary Security Policy, International Journal, the Journal of Global Security Studies, European Security, Asian Security, as well as the Journal of Transatlantic Studies. *more...*

...She has published a monograph with Oxford University Press titled American Allies in Times of War: The Great Asymmetry (2013) and four edited volumes, including The Future of US Extended Deterrence (co-edited with Andreas Wenger), Georgetown University Press (2015) and Countering Violent Extremism and Terrorism: Assessing Domestic and International Strategies, McGill-Queen's University Press (2020).

Stéfanie von Hlatky is the founder of Women in International Security-Canada, the Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel at the Princess of Wales' Own Regiment and the co-host of the security and defence podcast Battle Rhythm. She has received grants and awards from NATO, the Canadian Department of National Defence, the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council of Canada, Public Safety, the Government of Ontario's Ministry of Research and Innovation and Fulbright Canada.

Thomas Juneau is associate professor at the University of Ottawa's Graduate School of Public and International Affairs. His research focuses on the Middle East, in particular Iran and Yemen, on the role of intelligence in national security and foreign policy making, on Canadian foreign and defence policy, and on international relations theory. He is a non-resident fellow with the Sanaa Center for Strategic Studies. Mr. Timothy Lannan

Head, Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Centre, NATO - Operations Division

Timothy (Tim) Lannan joined the International Staff at NATO Headquarters in Brussels, Belgium in 2007 where he is the Head of the Euro Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Centre.

He is a proud veteran of the Canadian Armed Forces, from where he retired as a Senior Officer, having served 15 years domestically and 8 years internationally deployed, including to hostile environments. Tim is a graduate of the Royal Military College of Canada, and the United States Naval Postgraduate School where he earned a Masters of Science degree in Defense Analysis in the fields of Special Operations and Low-Intensity Conflict.

Quin Lucie joined the DHS Office of Strategy, Policy and Plans - Infrastructure, Risk and Resilience in September 2021. Previously, he had been a member of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Office of Chief Counsel, since 2006. Lieutenant-General Olivier Rittiman *Commandant, NATO Defense College*

Lieutenant General Olivier Rittimann was born on 17th July 1961. A graduate of the Military Academy of Saint Cyr and the Army Engineer School, he chose to serve with the Foreign Legion. In 1984, he was posted to the 4th Foreign Legion Regiment as a platoon leader in charge of the basic instruction of new Legionnaires. In 1986, he joined the 6th Foreign Legion Engineer Regiment where he served as platoon leader and company commander. During these years, he was deployed on operations in Chad, Mayotte, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Iraq.

In 1992 he was selected as an instructor at the Military Academy, and in 1994, he was sent to the United States Army General Staff College in Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and the Armed Forces Staff College in Norfolk, Virginia. Upon his return to France, he successfully completed the course of the Joint Defence College in Paris and, in 1996 returned to the 6th Foreign Legion Engineer Regiment – in charge of operations and training.

After an operational tour in the NATO-led Stabilization Force in Bosnia and Herzegovina (SFOR) in 1997, he was assigned in 1998 to Allied Forces North Headquarters in Brunssum, Netherlands, where he served in both the 'Training and Exercises' and 'Policy and Concepts' branches as the first French officer inserted within the NATO Command Structure, as a result of the implementation of the Combined Joint Task Force concept. There he worked in particular on the transformation of the Allied Command Europe Mobile Force Land brigade to a rapid reaction division level unit, a work that served as the foundation for the NATO Reaction Force (NRF) concept adopted a year later in 2002.

In 2001, he took command of the 1st Foreign Legion Engineer Regiment where he reorganized the operational preparation program to adapt to the foreseeable commitments of his units, of which the opening of the Afghan theatre in December 2001. Following a successful command, in 2003 he attended the Pakistani National Defence College in Islamabad and was then assigned to the French embassy as Defence Attaché. Following the October 2005 earthquake, he coordinated the arrival of the air component of the NRF provided by France, and the French medical and logistical units deployed during the following months.

At the end of his tour, in 2007, he was posted to the Joint Staff in Paris, as Chief of the NATO branch. When the French political authorities decided to return to full military participation in NATO, he took part in the negotiations leading to an increase in French military presence within the NATO Command structure.

Promoted to Brigadier General in 2010, he was assigned to Allied Force Command Heidelberg as Director Joint Coordination Centre in the Deployable Joint Staff Element. In this capacity, he was deployed to the International Security and Assistance Force (ISAF) from January 2011 to January 2012 as Chief of Operations, covering current operations, force generation and counter-Improvised Explosive Device (IED) issues, at a time when the force was over 100,000 strong. *more...*

...In 2012, he was assigned as French Deputy Military Representative (MILREP) to NATO Headquarters. Then in August 2015, he became the French National Military Representative to NATO's Allied Command Operations in Mons, Belgium, and some months later promoted to Major General in January 2016. There he participated to the definition of the French force package deployed in the Baltic States in the framework of the Enhanced Forward Presence concept.

On 1st September 2017, he was promoted to Lieutenant-General and appointed Chief of Staff at Joint Force Command Brunssum. He led this Headquarters in the preparation and the execution of the major exercise Trident Juncture 2018, the first reconnecting with a high intensity scenario under Article V. On 1st July 2018, he becomes Vice Chief of Staff Supreme Headquarters Allied Powers Europe, position in which he more specifically dealt with Training and Exercises for Allied Command Operations and Partnerships. In March 2019, because of the likely exit of the United Kingdom from the European Union, he also became operation commander for the EU operation Althea in Bosnia and Herzegovina, a position previously occupied by the British Deputy SACEUR. In addition, during the sanitary crisis in March 2020, he also acted as the Allied Command Operation COVID 19 Task Force commander. Elected to this position by the NATO Military Committee in September 2019, Lieutenant General Rittimann assumed his current duties, as Commandant of the NATO Defense College in Rome, Italy, on 16th July 2020. Lieutenant General Olivier Rittimann is married to Claudine and they have five children.



Major-General M.-H. St-Louis, OMM, MSC, MSM, CD Acting Commander, Canadian Army

Major General (MGen) Michel-Henri St-Louis was born in Managua, Nicaragua and was commissioned as an infantry officer within the Royal 22e Régiment in 1992.

He arrived at Canadian Army Doctrine and Training Center (CADTC) after commanding Joint Task Force (JTF) IMPACT, Canada's largest deployed joint force that provides, from Kuwait, the national command and control node to the Canadian Armed Forces capacity building efforts in Iraq, Lebanon and Jordan. MGen St-Louis was appointed as Acting Commander Canadian Army on 19 April 2021.

Before commanding JTF-IMPACT, MGen St-Louis was appointed Deputy Commanding General for Operations of America's First Corps (US Army) at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington State. Col. Trevor Teller Canadian Army Visiting Defence Fellow, CIDP

Colonel Teller was born and raised in Lethbridge, Alberta, and joined the Canadian Armed Forces in 1990. Upon completion of pilot training in 1994 he was posted to 417 Combat Support Squadron in Cold Lake, Alberta where he flew the CH118 Iroquois for one year before it was retired and replaced by the CH146 Griffon. In 2000 he posted to 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron; during his time there he deployed to Bosnia-Herzegovina on Roto 8 and 13, as well as to Southern Alberta for the G8 Summit in 2002. MGen Michael Wright

Commander, Canadian Forces Intelligence Command (CFINTCOM)

Born and raised in Southern Ontario, Major-General Wright enrolled in the Canadian Armed Forces in 1990 and joined Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI) in 1994. He has served in all three Canadian Mechanized Brigade Groups and deployed on operations with all three Regular Force infantry regiments. He spent 11 years with 2 PPCLI in Winnipeg and Shilo, commanding at the platoon, company and battalion level. He also served three years with the Second Battalion of the Royal 22e Regiment. He commanded 2 CMBG from 2017-2018. He was appointed Commander CFINTCOM and Chief of Defence Intelligence in June 2021.
